Dear Parents, Carers, Children and Staff,

What a fabulous week it has been for being outdoors and enjoying the early summer. Lots of the photographs you have shared this week reflect the enormous fun and learning to be had outdoors and in the garden. Mrs Kauser's class even made 'My Garden' their home learning theme this week!

I know many of you are eager to know about transition arrangements for September. One thing that is certain is that all children will be returning to school in September and we are so pleased about this – it is lovely to have some 'pods' in school but the building just doesn't have the same energy without all our wonderful children and staff to fill it. We also welcome 21 new families joining us in the transition base, EYFS/Y1 and other classes in September.

Further DfE and government guidance is being issued to schools shortly, so once we have this information to ensure safe planning for September, we will issue class and teacher information along with social stories and a virtual transition session for families and children over teams. Although not possible for all classes, wherever it is possible, I want to limit the amount of change to children as they have experienced much of this over the last months. However, our children, families and staff have shown much resilience to adapt and cope well throughout the lockdown.

I appreciate that home learning has its challenges and is not always easy for parents, especially if you are working from home too. I would like to thank you for the tremendous support you have given to teachers and staff through working together with them to keep provision in place for children while at home.

We will be delivering a recovery curriculum in the first term to address children's social and emotional needs returning to school. Professor Barry Carpenter has led this research and work. It is important we give children time to reflect on their experiences of lockdown; adapt again to school life and ensure they stay safe and well while continuing as 'normally' as we can – our 'new normal'.

Over the next weeks until the end of term, teachers will be contacting parents/carers to hold a dialogue about how the provision of the EHCP has been transferred to home and any further adaptations that could be made to continue your child's effective provision. You may have heard of a form called 'Section M' which captures any adaptations made to your child's EHCP provision. This form will be completed along with you through teams or a phone call, as it is required by the local authority to monitor EHCP provision during this period. Your teacher or key person will be in touch to do this shortly.

Mathew and his brother have also been busy in the kitchen, baking brownies and biscuits.


(I made some brownies too this week, Mathew, but they didn't look as tempting as yours!)

Mrs kauser's Class




This week Mrs Kauser's class have based learning on the geography theme of 'My Garden' as part of their great outdoors topic.
